Message from the Chair

2023-24 year begins an exciting chapter in the history of the department of Gender Studies even as our field, along with Critical Race Theory, is under attack across the nation. When books are banned, professors silenced and censored, reproductive rights are under relentless attack and Trans people persecuted, in this highly politicized moment, we, in Gender Studies at UCLA celebrate that we not only resist and endure but thrive. We begin with the tenure and promotion of Professor Zeynep Korkman and the publication of her deeply insightful and path-breaking ethnography of fortune tellers in Turkey, a study of how feminized subjects resist the gender politics of heteropatriarchy, precarity and Islamic authoritarianism. As a reviewer recently noted, *Gendered Fortunes* "is a necessary read for those who aim to grasp the shifting terms of the affective atmosphere in the political sphere and public culture of millennial Turkey and how divination publics constitute novel public arrangements at the intersection of gender precarities, emotions, affect, neoliberalism and postsecularism." A scholar of the politics of transnational feminist solidarity, Dr. Korkman and the remarkable scholars of transnational feminism in the department (notably, Professors Judy Han and Juliann Anesi and new faculty Giancarlo Cornejo) mark Gender Studies, UCLA as the premier hub of transnational feminist scholarship.

The year also begins with Assistant Professor Giancarlo Cornejo who joins the department of Gender Studies as a scholar of Queer and Trans Studies. Professor Cornejo, whose work develops the idea of a Peruvian transfeminist imaginary, proposes *travestismo*, "as a critical tool to read the unstable and contested production of gender, sexuality, and race in contemporary Latin America." Professor Cornejo adds to the department's strength in Queer and Trans Studies forged by Professors Guzman, Han, Hong and others. In 2024, Professor Dan Bustillo will also join the faculty adding to this area of concentration and, significantly, enriching the department's strength in Latinx and Latin American Studies (Professors Marchant and Speed) as a new scholar of Trans Latinx Studies and media.

Finally, on October 19, 2023, Chicasaw scholar Professor Shannon Speed will be installed as the holder of the professorial Chair in Gender Studies established in honor of Indigenous feminist writer and former UCLA professor, Dr, Paula Gunn Allen. A groundbreaking feminist writer who brought to the world's attention a canon of Native American literature to which she herself contributed seventeen books ranging from works of poetry, novels, literary criticism, short stories and a remarkable body of essay, Dr. Gunn Allen had international impact on Feminist Studies. Dr. Speed's own award-winning work on Indigenous women migrants and violence follows in Dr. Gunn Allen's footsteps.



Giancarlo Cornejo is Assistant Professor in the Department of Gender Studies at the University of California, Los Angeles. He holds a Ph.D. in Rhetoric with a Designated Emphasis in Women, Gender and Sexuality from the University of California, Berkeley. Prior to joining UCLA in 2023, he was Assistant Professor in the Division of Cinema and Media Studies at the University of Southern California. His essays have appeared in journals such as *Camera Obscura: Feminism, Culture, and Media Studies, Estudos Feministas, GLQ: A Journal of Lesbian and Gay Studies, Journal of Homosexuality*, and *TSQ: Transgender Studies Quarterly*. His book manuscript, tentatively titled *Travesti Memory: Toward a Peruvian Transfeminist Imaginary*, proposes travestismo as a critical tool to read the unstable and contested production of gender, sexuality, and race in contemporary Latin America.

About the Paula Gunn Allen Chair: The Paula Gunn Allen Chair, a professorial chair established by the UCLA Department of Gender Studies to honor the memory and legacy of Paula Gunn Allen (1939–2008). Professor Allen was a groundbreaking scholar, writer and feminist whose outstanding academic contributions include being widely considered a founding figure of contemporary indigenous literature, defining a canon of Native American literature. As one of the key intellectual scholars of indigenous literature and history, her work and scholarship served as a bridge between indigenous literature writing and feminism. Professor Allen was a faculty member in the UCLA Department of English from 1990 to 1999 and was an active scholar with the now-established UCLA Department of American Indian Studies

About Shannon Speed: Shannon Speed is a citizen of the Chickasaw Nation. She is Professor of American Indian Studies, Gender Studies, and Anthropology at UCLA, where she also serves as Director of the American Indian Studies Center and Special Advisor to the Chancellor on Native American and Indigenous Affairs. Dr. Speed has worked for three decades in Mexico and the United States on issues of indigenous rights, gender, neoliberalism, violence, migration, and activist research. She is a recipient of the President's Award from the American Anthropological Association (AAA) and the Chickasaw Dynamic Woman of the Year award from the Chickasaw Nation. She served as the President of the Native American and Indigenous Studies Association (NAISA) from 2018 to 2021. Dr. Speed is active in her tribe's language revitalization program as a learner and teacher, and serves as a board member of Comunidades Indigenas en Liderazgo (CIELO) in Los Angeles.



4. Gender Studies Ph.D. Incoming Cohort Fall 2023

Cihangir Can (he/him) Cihangir's areas of interest include queer and feminist theories; politics of subjectivity and belonging in and beyond the Middle East; sexual globalization; and studies of religion, particularly Islam. His proposed Ph.D. research questions how religious Sunni Muslim men who have sex with men negotiate the politics of subjectivity and belonging in contemporary Turkey. To achieve this, Cihangir will employ a multi-sited ethnographic approach that spans both Istanbul and Kayseri, allowing for a nuanced and detailed analysis of the social and cultural dynamics at play. Nicolás and/or Nico De Leon (They/them) was born and raised in San Fernando Valley, California. They are currently finishing their master's program in Latin American studies at Cal State LA. Their research interests are U.S imperialism, settler colonialism, memory, Central American studies, performance studies, and LGBTI social movements in Central America.

Eunjin Lee Eunjin received her master's in Law from Seoul National University, South Korea. As an activist and researcher in South Korea, she has delved into issues such as militarized prostitution around US bases and population control policies through anti-abortion law. Her research interests center on the (re)production of gendered, sexualized, and racialized bodies in contexts of colonial governance, warfare, and security, with a particular focus on legal texts. While at UCLA, she plans to examine how biopolitical control is transformed and manifested in times of epidemic by tracing the legal renderings of infectious bodies that were considered as virulent threats to the nation-state.
